## COMMITTEE PROCEDURE

## COMMITTEES

All legislative delegates will be placed on a committee, usually the same one as your bill. These committees are on subjects like "Education" or "Transportation." Each committee will have a chair and clerk who will run the show. The committees:

- look at all the bills that fall under their subject
- debate them
- decide which ones will move on to be discussed in the House or Senate.

Each author will have a chance to present their bill and the committee will debate it. As a committee member, you want to rank favorably good bills that are well-thought-out and have the potential for good debate. At this point, even if you don't agree with a bill or you don't think it's a great idea, you should try to be as unbiased as possible. Your job is simply to decide if the entire chamber should get to debate on this bill or not.

## **PROCEDURE**

- Clerk confirms Bill Sponsor presence and asks for any amendments from sponsor
- Bill Sponsor Opening Statement (2 min)
  (Can motion to add any unused time to closing time by saying
   "I reserve the right to yield the remainder of my time to my closing")
- Technical Non-debatable Questions (2-3 min)
- Statements from the Governor's Cabinet and/or the Attorney General's office
- Open Debate (Includes motions) (5-7 mins)
  - No amendments are in order
  - Debate is OPEN and **not** restricted to the Pro or Con viewpoints.

## MOTIONS

- Ask a series of questions (Does the bill sponsor yield to a series of questions?)
- Motion to extend debate (I would like to make a motion to extend debate by # rounds)
- Motion to end debate (I would like to make a motion to end debate)
- Closing Statement (2-Min)
- Bill Ranking
